Metro Central Corridor Improvements:

Summer 2013 Major Line Closure

Central corridor improvements



- Bridges and structures works (2010)
- South Gosforth junction replaced (October 2012)
- West Jesmond/South Gosforth stations refurbished (spring 2013)
- Track and drainage replaced (summer 2013)
- Ilford Road station refurbished (summer 2013)
- Earthworks and embankments renewed (2015)

Scope of works: summer 2013



- 6km of track and track beds replaced South Gosforth to Jesmond
- 3km of new drainage South Gosforth to Jesmond
- Cabling and cable routes replaced Airport-Fawdon
- Station refurbishments including Ilford Road
- 16,000 tonnes of spoil removed and disposed
- 12,000t new ballast; 560t of new rail; 7,000 new sleepers

450 trains per day and high frequency increases impact of any problem



Revised service plans




- No trains Airport to Haymarket 4 August to 30 August inclusive
- Replacement bus service for all stations
- Express shuttle bus Airport to city centre
- Doubled train service Four Lane Ends to St James
- Reduced peak frequency Haymarket to Pelaw

- 26-28 July Sunderland Airshow
- 2 September Schools return
- 14-15 September Great North Run weekend


Reducing disruption



- 24 hour and 7-day working. (Reduces disruption by 15 days compared to weekend possessions).
- Pre-welding track sections reduces need for line closure
- Over resourcing to achieve higher productivity
- Minimal work across Metro September 2013 to February 2014 from 1900 hours in 2012/13 to 900 hours in 2013/14









Summer 2013 Metro central corridor improvements

Your questions answered

What's happening with Metro modernisation this summer?

We plan to close the Metro line between Haymarket and Airport for 27 days from 4 August until 1 September to carry out a series of major projects. The biggest pieces of work will be the complete replacement of almost 6km of track and trackbeds and the laying of 3km of new drainage from Jesmond station to South Gosforth, and including our non-passenger relief line through the city centre. We shall also be refurbishing stations and replacing cable routes on the line to Newcastle Airport. This all forms part of the £385m Metro: all change modernisation programme, a once in a generation investment to ensure the region has a reliable Metro system for decades to come.

Why is the work needed?

The track between Jesmond and South Gosforth (see pictures) is at the end of its life after 33 years; if it is not replaced then it will become increasingly vulnerable to failure and speed restrictions, causing delay and disruption which would be felt throughout the Metro system, as every train - 450 every day - use this stretch with a service every three minutes in peak periods. The trackbed and drainage is Victorian in origin and is also now failing, leaving puddles and patches of mud damaging the tracks above, which this major piece of work will address.
